Semi-Annual Board Meeting

From its founding in 1910 until the mid-1970s, the Annual Meeting of the Memorial's Board of Directors was held on Washington's Birthday at the Memorial. Now it is held in conjunction with the Conference of Grand Masters of North America. However, the Board voted several years ago to hold a Semi-Annual Meeting in August at the Memorial in order to bring the Board Members to the Memorial to experience this great tribute to Washington first hand. Words, photos and video can never do it adequate justice. Visiting and meeting in the Memorial never fails to inspire and to strengthen the commitment of the Board Members to the vision and mission of the Memorial Association.



MESSAGE FROM ALEXANDRIA

Providence and Our Lasting Mission

In Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation, October 3, 1789, he wrote that "it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor." What a timely and true message this

is for us today, not only as a nation but as individuals. Washington firmly believed that Divine Providence was guiding and protecting our new nation as it came into being. In a letter to Martha written June 18, 1775, he expressed that "as it has been a kind of destiny, that has thrown me upon this service, I shall hope that my undertaking it is designed to answer some good purpose I shall rely, therefore, confidently on that Providence, which has heretofore preserved and been bountiful to me."

The great men who conceived and built this Memorial to honor Washington's noble attributes understood his unwavering trust in God. They also took great risks and relied upon Divine Providence to secure the necessary funding to complete the Memorial. They saw this towering edifice as much more than just a grand commemoration in stone to a great man. In 1927, Louis A. Watres, Past Grand Master of Pennsylvania and second President of the Memorial Association wrote, "It is more—infinitely more—than a Memorial to Washington. It is an outstanding landmark to Freemasonry in its best estate. It is a monument to civil and religious liberty and the stable, orderly and constitutional government that was founded and formed by Washington and the galaxy of patriotic men among whom were included the foremost Masons of his time."

Indeed we have much to be thankful for. Divine Providence provided us with the right man at the right time. Our nation would not have come into being without George Washington, just as our Memorial would not have come into being without Louis Watres,

Charles Callahan and other great men of that generation and we are truly thankful for them. Now it is up to us. Now it is our turn to carry forward the work begun so long ago. It is up to us to live the just and upright life that was so well exemplified by the Father of our Country.

His life was a journey of self-improvement through honesty, integrity, dignity and courage. He never failed to accept the tremendous burdens that were placed upon him. We too must accept the challenges and responsibilities of carrying forward the task of preserving, maintaining and improving this magnificent Memorial to Brother George Washington. We too must always keep in mind that the efforts of man are only truly successful with the guidance and support of Divine Providence.

That is an essential moral lesson taught universally in our lodges, and we are grateful that America's Freemasons understand the important role the Memorial plays in spreading that light through the promotion of the virtues and character of George Washington. Accordingly, we deeply appreciate the support that we receive from local Masonic bodies. Recently, I received a letter from Lavina-Temple Lodge N^{o} 101 in Lavina, Montana, whose brethren voted to send us a gift of one dollar for each of their members. Thank you, brethren, for the gift and for the Masonic spirit that inspired it.

We are thankful for George Washington, we are thankful for the great men who conceived and built the Memorial, we are thankful for Freemasonry and its wonderful Tenets of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth, and we are thankful for the support and involvement of the Freemasons and Friends of the Memorial for all they do for the Memorial and for Freemasonry. Your support allows us "To inspire humanity through education to emulate and promote the virtues, character and vision of George Washington, the Man, the Mason and Father of our Country."


Grand Lodge of Nevada Joins \$1 Per Member Campaign



Thomas Jacob Shryock

Part One: Man & Mason


The George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association reflects American history, and more especially the American Freemasons who built it. This is particularly evident in the life of the Memorial's first President, Thomas Jacob Shryock (1851–1918). He was an ambitious and complex man who served as Grand Master of Maryland for 33 years. He represents America's Gilded Age and the generation of Freemasons who translated Charles Callahan's dream of the Memorial into reality.

The Shryock family emigrated from Prussia in the 1700s and settled in Baltimore. Henry Shryock, Thomas' great-grandfather, served as lieutenant colonel in a Maryland regiment during the War for Independence. In 1788, while a member of the Maryland Assembly, he voted to ratify the U.S. Constitution and bring the "Old Line State" into the Union. His grandson, Thomas' father, Henry Shryock (1808–1881) owned a successful Baltimore lumber company.

Shryock's mother, Ann Ophelia Shields (1814–1882) grew up in Alexandria, Virginia. In 1824, as a young child, she recited a welcoming ode to General Lafayette when he returned to the city. Her father, Thomas Shields, was a member of Alexandria-Brooke Lodge N° 2, which held a welcoming banquet for "The Nation's Guest" jointly with Alexandria-Washington Lodge N° 22. Ann's three sons became Baltimore Freemasons. The elder, William H. Shryock (1835–1902) joined Landmark Lodge N° 127 in 1869, and Thomas joined Waverly Lodge N° 152 in 1871. The youngest, Richard F. Shryock (1856–1921) was initiated, passed and raised in Landmark Lodge while his eldest brother was Worshipful Master.

Educated in Baltimore's public schools and at the Light Street Institute, Thomas began working with his father and brother in the family's lumber business. At the age of 30, after his father's death, he formed Thomas J. Shryock & Co. and expanded by building Baltimore's Shryock Wharf and opening a branch in Washington, D.C. Thirty years later his St. Lawrence Broom & Manufacturing Co., of Ronceverte, West Virginia, owned over 100,000 acres of white pine forest and annually processed more than 25 million feet of lumber. To bring his timber from West Virginia to the Eastern seaboard he organized and served as president of the Iron Mountain and Greenbrier Railroad. The railroad also carried tourists to White Sulphur Springs and to the famous Greenbrier Hotel, which he helped finance. He also served as a director of Baltimore's Second National Bank, the Consolidated Gas & Electric Company and Bell Telephone of Pennsylvania.

Equally energetic in state affairs, Shryock achieved several notable offices. Locally, he was appointed Baltimore's Police Com-



missioner and later a member of the Sewerage Commission. A life-long member of the Republican Party, he was elected Treasurer and then Chairman of his party's state Central Committee. The Maryland Assembly elected him State Treasurer, 1896–1900. Gov. Lloyd Lowndes commissioned him a brigadier general and Chief of Staff of the state militia. Ever afterwards, when not addressed as the Grand Master, he was known as General Shryock.

Shryock married twice. With his first wife, Marie Eliza Heckman Mann, they had five children: Daise, Amelia, Marie, Anna and Thomas (who died in infancy). After Marie died, he married Cassie Belle Miller and together they had three children: Catherine, Thomas J. Jr. and Orpha. His community engagement continued to expand, as he served as Treasurer of the Springfield State Hospital, president of an orphanage for African-American boys and numerous civic committees, associations and clubs.

A simple recounting of Shryock's respected family, successful enterprises and high offices does not fully reveal the man. Like other wealthy men of his day, such as Andrew W. Mellon or John D. Rockefeller, Shryock lived by a simple faith, a strict morality and a deep sentimentality. Just 14 when the Civil War ended, and living in a major railroad and port city, Shryock was enabled to realize

every commercial opportunity Reconstruction and the Gilded Age made available to an enterprising young man.

With his financial success came political influence and civic duties that he readily accepted as his personal responsibility to fulfil. And that he sought admission into a Masonic lodge, and for over 40 years gave his time and talent to the Craft, demonstrated his realization that life was about far more than attaining affluence and wielding influence.

Shryock's last great calling was to serve George Washington. Like every American of his age, he learned of Washington in school and revered him through public celebrations. His membership in the Society of the Cincinnati and the Sons of the American Revolution confirmed his patriotism. As Grand Master of Maryland, Shryock well understood and appreciated Washington's patronage of the Craft.

The 1899 centennial Masonic commemoration of Washington's funeral at Mt. Vernon set in motion the forces that would create the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association in 1910. More than 300 Freemasons from around the country attended the ceremony hosted by Alexandria-Washington Lodge N° 22. Leading his delegation, Shryock responded for Maryland Freemasons during the solemn tomb-side service:

From the mountains to the Chesapeake his fame dwells secure. But a river divides his birthplace and his tomb from our Commonwealth. All the seas could not divide us from our love and admiration of his memory.

Three years later, the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania held a banquet to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Washington's initiation. President Theodore Roosevelt, Pennsylvania Governor and Brother William A. Stone, and numerous other civic, business and Masonic leaders attended. Brother Roosevelt spoke, in part, about the Craft:

One of the things that attracted me so greatly to Masonry, that I hailed the chance of becoming a Mason, was that it really did act up to what we, as a government and as a people, are pledged to,—of treating each man on his merits as a man. When Brother George Washington went into a Lodge of the Fraternity he went into the one place in the United States where he stood below or above his fellows according to their official position in the Lodge. He went into the place where the idea of our government was realized, as far as it is humanly possible for mankind to realize a lofty ideal.

Later, Grand Master Shryock said in response to a toast:

You have often heard it said that "Masonry is the handmaiden of religion." Let me tell you that she is also the right hand of those

who build with Washington, and that she will ever continue to be the bulwark of civil and religious liberty of the great Republic of ours. The work of Washington and the work of Freemasonry is not to cease at the dawn of the twentieth century, but it is to go on and on, until the whole world is brought within the influence of this great giant Republic of ours, and only the Grand Master above knows what the dawn of the twenty-first century will show, as the outgrowth of Washington's beginnings.

Part Two of this article will examine Shryock's deep love of the Craft and how he employed his great talents, as President of the Memorial Association, to give Freemasons living in the twenty-first century a stately and fitting Memorial to perpetuate George Washington's memory "until time shall be no more."

Bro. Eyer's scholarship and editorial work is well known to many Freemasons through two periodicals that he edits which are devoted to the study of Masonic life and history: Philalethes, North America's oldest independent Masonic magazine, and Ahiman: A Review of Masonic Culture and Tradition, a critically-acclaimed research journal. He has presented major research papers at the International Conference on the History of Freemasonry and the California Masonic Symposium.

He received his Masonic degrees

at Orinda Lodge Nº 122 in Orinda, California, and is a Past Master (2007, 2009-2011) of Academia Lodge Nº 847 in Oakland, California. He is a 32° K.C.C.H. member of the Oakland Scottish Rite Bodies. He holds a Master of Arts in Psychology from John F. Kennedy University in California, and a Bachelor of Arts in Religious Studies and Psychology from The Defiance College in Ohio.



New Photography Exhibit Debuts on the Ninth Floor

ecently, guests on the Memorial's daily guided tours have enjoyed a new exhibit created by Director of Collections Mark Tabbert. Installed on the ninth floor, it comprises a set of 15 beautifully-reproduced historical photographs that depict the construction of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial.

The ninth floor had previously housed materials pertaining to the Tall Cedars of Lebanon. That display was dedicated in 1983, when Supreme Tall Cedar Jacob C. Matthenius, Jr. cut the ribbon. 400 guests came to the Memorial for the event.

Exhibits at the Memorial have been reconfigured so that information relating to appendant and concordant bodies within Masonry is concentrated on the third floor, in a new exhibit called The Family of Freemasonry. Beginning in November 2011, the Tall Cedars' objects on the ninth floor were carefully removed, inventoried, photographed and packed. The Tall Cedars transported all material not reused in *The* Family of Freemasonry display back to their headquarters in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Along with the smaller artifacts, the throne, three tall glass display cabinets, long painted mural and a "time capsule" placed within the north wall of the ninth floor were also removed.

In the ninth floor redesign, the wood paneling was retained, and new carpeting and lighting were installed. The room was also repainted and benches were added. The doors to the observation deck and the windows were replaced, allowing more sunlight into the room.

Visitors now often stop to study the framed prints of the historic photographs before concluding their tour. Be sure to visit this new exhibit on your next trip to the Memorial.






