Over 600 people from around the world visited the George Washington Masonic Memorial on May 7 at a reception the Memorial hosted as part of the 9th World Conference of Masonic Grand Lodges.

Guests were serenaded by a classical string quartet as they passed through the portico into the grand entrance space of Memorial Hall at the base of the 17 ft. bronze statue of George Washington where they were welcomed by Memorial President Michael D. Brumback; Akram R. Elias, Grand Master of the District of Columbia and Conference Host; Edmund Cohen, Grand Master of Virginia; Robert B. Heyat, Conference Chairman; Thomas W. Jackson, Executive Secretary of the Conference and George D. Seghers, Executive Director of the Memorial. Guests then proceeded on to view the new exhibit on American Freemasonry. From there, they proceeded to Grand Masonic Hall where they enjoyed a sumptuous and elegantly appointed buffet and more enchanting melodies from the quartet.

Guests were also invited on tours of the building. The Memorial received numerous positive comments on the evening all throughout the Conference and is grateful that so many Masons from all parts of the world had an opportunity to visit this magnificent tribute to Brother George Washington.

Greetings From The President

Brother George Washington was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in the Lodge at Fredricksburg, Virginia (now No. 4) on August 4, 1753. The Lodge was self-congregated, comprised of a group of Scotch-Irish Masons, but did not officially receive its Charter from the Grand Lodge of Scotland until 1758. This procedure was not at all uncommon in 18th century Masonic circles.

The 17 ft. bronze statue located in Memorial Hall of the George Washington Masonic Memorial was donated by the young men of DeMolay and dedicated by President and Brother Harry Truman. The heroic statue depicts Washington as the Charter Worshipful Master of Alexandria Lodge No. 22. He also remained a member of Fredericksburg Lodge No. 4 until his death in 1799.

There is no doubt that Masonry had a profound effect on George Washington because he attended Masonic functions, and referred to Masonry in writing throughout his life. His belief in the principles of Freemasonry is further attested by his statements, such as: "The fabric of our freedom is placed on the enduring basis of public virtue, and will, I fondly hope, long continue to protect the prosperity of the architects who raised it. I shall be happy on every occasion, to evince my regard for the Fraternity."

The gifts he made to his Lodge, and the gifts from his family (after his death) also indicate Washington's love of Masonry. Upon being elected Charter Master of Alexandria Lodge No. 22, he selected a handsome leather chair from the library of his home at Mt. Vernon and had it taken to his Lodge to serve as the Master's chair. This same chair now sits in the East of the Replica Lodge Room in the Memorial. The William Williams' portrait Washington sat for in 1794 as a gift to his Lodge now hangs above the Master's chair. The silver trowel, which he used to lay the cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol, along with a Masonic square, is also on display. One of my favorite artifacts is the bedchamber clock that still shows the time when the physician stopped it at the moment of his death. That physician, Dr. Elisha Cullen Dick, was Worshipful Master of Alexandria Lodge No. 22 and conducted the Masonic funeral service for "The General."

Every Grand Lodge in the United States donated, built and continues to voluntarily maintain the pink granite memorial to George Washington and Freemasonry. All Masons in the United States are, in fact, part owners of this beautifully maintained edifice. So, please plan on making a sojourn to the Memorial with your family and learn more about George Washington and the importance Masonry played in the founding of this great country. If your Lodge would like to plan a trip to the Memorial, the Memorial staff will be happy to assist you.

I promise you that you will leave the George Washington Masonic Memorial proud to be a Freemason.

New Exhibit Opens During World Conference

Update on Current and Future Projects

The first months of 2008 witnessed the fruition of many **I** projects. New murals and busts of Washington in the first floor niches were completed as the last of the Masonic temple postcard prints were installed. And phase one of the Memorial's new Masonic exhibit on American Freemasonry titled "Freemasonry: Building Men and Building Communities" opened to rave reviews on May 7 during the 9th World Conference of Masonic Grand Lodges. The exhibit also incorporates a new display area for the Grand Lodge of the Month Program which was inaugurated at the Conference with an outstanding display from the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. Phase two of the exhibit will open in August and include Masonic decorative art objects and historical panels on Freemasons in the American Revolution, Civil War and the 20th century. Also scheduled in August is the installation of a bronze bust of Washington for the large niche at the east end of Grand Masonic Hall.



Featured in the new exhibit are the rough (shown here in foreground) and perfect stones with George Washington in the center. The exhibit also highlights the Masonic lives of Benjamin Franklin, Andrew Jackson and Harry Truman and is designed around the 47th Problem of Euclid, a symbol of perfection.

Concurrent with these material renovations, the Memorial project to digitize Masonic Annual Proceedings is gaining wider acceptance and promotion among several Grand Lodges. The Memorial has also addressed its website with the expectation that a new design will be launched by the end of the year. Looking to and beyond the Memorial Association's centennial in 2010 are many exciting projects. A few of them are briefly cited here with more details to follow later.

"The Masonic Family of Fraternities" Exhibit – Working closely with the Grotto International, the Memorial will renovate the tower's largest room on the 3rd floor to include not only a new Grotto exhibit, but other Appendant and Affiliated continued on page 3

Message From Alexandria

Recently I was given a copy of "Doug Smith Speaking - Selected Writings of Alfred Douglas Smith, Jr." Within this excellent volume was a selection titled "Address at the Dedication of the North Room of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial – 1949." He wrote, "Buildings are but the symbols of the ideals of those who build them,

and their use, manifestations of the philosophy in action. Through the arrangements of these materials and the location itself, future generations shall read the spirit of Washington the man, and measure the vitality of the idealism of the men of our generation."

This is a powerful statement that is as relevant today as it was when written in 1949. The Memorial building is a strong, beautiful and enduring structure. The portico, our east, main entrance, is fashioned after the Parthenon - the most beautiful, sublime and perfect example of classical architecture in the world. The three orders of classical architecture, Doric, Ionic and Corinthian, are portrayed as pilasters on the exterior of the three levels of the Memorial tower. A stepped pyramid serves as the roof of the Memorial tower. The stepped pyramid was the first structure built by mankind to honor Deity. At the top of the pyramid is a tall, graceful lantern to spread the light of Freemasonry to the four corners of the earth. The design and the architectural features chosen by our forefathers, the builders of the Memorial, are perfect. They are solid granite manifestations of the Masonic teachings as portrayed in our Masonic rituals and Masonic writings. The Memorial stands solid, straight and square, just as George Washington stood and as all Masons should stand.

Bodies such as DeMolay, Job's Daughters, High Twelve and the Order of the Eastern Star. The renovation is scheduled for completion by February 2010.

"George Washington as Freemason" Portrait – As part of the centennial celebration, the Association will hold a world-wide competition to commission a new Washington portrait. Progressing in the line of portraits, from the Williams of 1794, the Leutze of 1856 and the Burdette of 1932, it will present Washington as a Freemason for the new century.

A Centennial History of the George Washington Masonic Memorial Association – Published in time for February 2010, this will be a "coffee table" book richly illustrated and cowritten by former librarian Dustin Smith and myself. It will celebrate the Masons who built the Memorial and dedicated themselves to preserving the memory and Masonic virtues of Washington.

Freemasonry at Mount Vernon – In February 2011, an exhibition on George Washington and Freemasonry will open

International Freemasonry – Also for 2011, discussions are underway for an exhibit on Freemasonry around the world that would include such Masonic patriots as Garibaldi, Bolivar, O'Connell and Kossuth. The exhibit would also include the vast international Masonic regalia collection of R.W. Bro. Thomas W. Jackson, PGS of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania and Secretary of the World Conference of Grand Masters.

International Conference on the History of Freemasonry – In May 2011, the Memorial will host the third International Conference on the History of Freemasonry. This Conference brings together the finest academic scholars from around the world.
